

# Featured Resource: Insurance Litigation by Jonathan Briggs

In the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey, we expect that many Fort Bend residents are dealing with insurance



claims they sustained. The hope is always that the insurance claims process goes well, however, if that is not the situation there are remedies available. First, look to the policy itself for the respective duties and rights of the insurer and insured during the claims process and for information regarding payment and disputes. If the problem or dispute with your claim cannot be resolved, then litigation against your insurance company may become a necessity. When a policyholder sues their insurance company it is called a "first party" action. The Fort Bend County Law Library has an excellent resource for you and your attorney in this regard entitled *Insurance Litigation* by Mark L. Kincaid and Christopher W. Martin, part of the *Texas Practice Guide* by Thomson Reuters. It provides a comprehensive look at the litigation you may need to bring to enforce your rights against your insurer on important topics

such as causes of action available (both those arising from the insurance policy contract and "extra-contractual" claims); the time limitations for bringing such actions (which may be governed by the policy terms as opposed to statute); the jurisdictional issues that may arise (for example, contractual claims brought on federally-administered flood insurance policies may have to be brought in federal court); and monetary damages potentially available to plaintiffs. Copies of pages of the book can be made for \$.10 a page.

#### This Month's Featured Technology: Converting PDF to Word and Back Again

Have you made an error on your document, need to fix it, and then e-file it? Did you know you can convert PDF documents to Word and then back to PDF? You can at the Law Library using our Adobe Pro software. Scan the document to PDF using one of our photo copiers or the scanner. Then save the document in PDF. Once that is done, open the document using Adobe Pro. Select "open with" once you have right clicked on the document. Use the "Save As" feature and save the document as a Word document or .docx. You then can open the document in Word and make your

changes. After finishing, you can save the document again using the "Save As" feature and select PDF. For questions or a demonstration, contact the Law Library.

# **Texas Case Law Update**

#### **Local Cases**

- Blair v. McClinton, No. 01-16-00431-CV (Oct. 13, 2017): Mot. for Reh'g. Denied. (505th Dist.)
- In Re James Boone, No. 01-17-00672-CR (Sept. 28, 2017): Pet. for Writ Mand. Dism'd. (240th)
- In Re Expunction, No. 01-17-00021-CV (Sept. 26, 2017): Appeal Dism'd. (268th)
- Crotts v. State of Texas, No. 01-15-01108-CR (Sept. 12, 2017): Mot. for Reh'g. and Mot. for En Banc Consideration denied. (CCL#3)
- Grant v. Grant, No. 01-16-00581-CV (Sept. 7, 2017): Aff'd. TC judgment. (387th)
- Tex. Dept. Crim. Jus. v. Mendoza, No. 14-17-00117-CV (Sept. 26, 2017): Rev. and Rend against TDCJ. (240th)
- Milton v. Nguyen, No. 14-16-00883-CV (Sept. 12, 2017): Aff'd. dismissal by TC. (CCL#4)
- In the Interest of D.A., a Child, No. 14-16-00491-CV (Sept. 7, 2017): Aff'd. TC order. (505th)

#### **Criminal Law**

- Lovett v. State of Texas, 523 S.W.3d 342 (Tex.App.-Fort Worth 2017): Licensed gun owner's right to open carry in Texas intersected with police officers' reasonable concerns for safety; conduct of defendant did not rise to standard to support disorderly conduct conviction but court upheld conviction on interference with police duties.
- Baldit v. State of Texas, 522 S.W. 3d 753 (Tex.App.-Houston[1st Dist.] 2017): Defendant convicted of assault of family member by pushing against wall, holding by neck, dragging across floor. Court upheld conviction on grounds that reasonable jury could have inferred that def. was conduct was reasonably certain to cause bodily injury and upheld that 6-year old child of complaining witness was competent to testify.

#### Family Law

- In Re S.S., Relator, 522 S.W.3d 576 (Tex.App.-Houston[14th Dist.] 2017): Court of Appeals granted mandamus and ordered trial court to vacate its Emergency Jurisdiction Order that ordered child be returned to father in India in that no evidence was offered by father of actual or threatened abuse.
- In Re David E. Martin, Relator, 523 S.W.3d 165 (Tex.App.-Dallas 2017): Where maternal grand-parents were part of agreed judgment concerning visitation with grandchildren (mother deceased, father as sole managing conservator), they had standing to modify conservatorship owing to status as parties affected by court order.

#### Attorney Discipline

Thawer v. Commission for Lawyer Discipline, 523 S.W.3d 177 (Tex.App.-Dallas 2017): Discipline against already suspended attorney was upheld where said attorney failed to disclose her suspension status to client and was thus found to have engaged in conduct involving dishonesty, fraud, deceit, or misrepresentation. In violation of Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct.

#### **Property Law**

• Garrett v. Sympson, 523 S.W.3d 862 (Tex.App.-Fort Worth 2017): Where neighborhood of single family homes had deed restrictions forbidding use of homes for commercial/business use, ambiguous language of restriction did not prohibit appellants/owners from renting out home for short-term/vacation rentals.
