

This Month's Featured Resource: Texas Elder Law by Vaughn James

With much of the Baby Boomer generation well into retirement age, longer life expectancies, and just a general concern with how we will deal with legal and other issues affecting our parents and other senior citizens, this month's Featured Resource is particularly relevant. The Law Library recently received the 2018 edition of *Texas Elder Law* by Vaughn James, published by Texas Lawyer/ALM Media. Mr. James is an attorney and professor of law at Texas Tech University School of Law, teaching courses in elder law, estate law, and tax law. This book is packed with information in a user-friendly form covering the full-breadth of topics in this area, including: elder rights and protection; family and marital issues; homestead rights; dementia and Alzheimer's; managing resources for the



elderly, including power of attorney, guardianships, and trusts; paying for long-term care; advance directives for medical and end-of-life issues; wills; trusts; what to do when death occurs; and, probate. *Texas Elder Law* is a great resource for attorneys and lay-persons dealing with these important issues for clients and loved ones. This Month's Featured Technology: Tech Services at the Fort Bend County Law Library

Coming to the court house can be hectic and forgetting documents can



happen. Fortunately, we are right inside the court house to help! We have many services you need such as internet access including WiFi, printing and scanning services, photo copying, fax, and the ability to convert documents into different formats for editing. The only thing we charge you is \$0.10 a page for black and white copies or prints, and a \$1.00 a page for color prints. Faxing is \$1.00 a page for local, and \$2.00 a page for long distance. Texas Case Law Update

Local Cases

- <u>In Re Walmart</u>, No. 01-17-00771-CV (Jan. 11, 2018): Pet. Writ Mand. Dism'd. (268th)
- Gabriella Atkins-Bee v. Alfred Bee, Jr. No. 01-17-00821-CV (Jan. 11, 2018): Appeal Dism'd. (387th)
- Harper v. State of Texas, No. 01-14-00641-CR (Jan. 9, 2018): Aff'd. TC judgment. (434th)
- <u>In Re Jason Pegues</u>, No. 01-17-00917-CR (Jan. 9, 2018): Pet. Writ Mand. Denied. (434th)
- Richard Bryant v. Robin Bryant, No. 01-17-00446-CV (Dec. 128 2017): Appeal Dism'd. (505th)
- American Surgical Assistants, v. Chaudhry and Universal Surgical Assistants, No. 14-17-00706-CV Jan. 4, 2018): Appeal Dism'd. (434th)
- <u>Darwin Fisher v. State of Texas</u>, No. 14-17-00345-CR (Dec. 14, 2017): Affirmed. (400th)

Criminal Law

- DeLeon v. State of Texas, 530 S.W.3d 207 (Tex.App.-Eastland 2017): Defendant took a plea for offense of tampering with evidence (concealed marijuana in mouth) with prior felony enhancement, 4 years in TDCJ. This followed denial by the TC of a motion to suppress, which Defendant appealed. Court of Appeals found that officer had probable cause to search based on totality of circumstances, including odor, and warrantless search was justified as exigent circumstances existed to prevent imminent destruction of evidence. Affirmed.
- Doremus v. State of Texas, 530 S.W. 3d 277 (Tex.App.-Houston[14th Dist.] 2017): Defendant convicted of DWI appealed contending TC error in denying motion to suppress and in instructions to jury. Appeals court found that counsel did not properly preserve objection on issue of lack of probable cause to arrest. Court also found that Defendant consented to blood draw and there was no coercion by officer. Finally, Court of Appeals found that TC did not abuse discretion in denying jury instruction per CCP 38.23 o legality of evidence. Affirmed.

Family Law

- Roberts v. Roberts, 531 S.W.3d 224 (Tex.App.-San Antonio 2017): Husband appealed order of spousal support in favor of disabled wife. Court of Appeals found testimony of party seeking maintenance was alone insufficient to support TC's determination of incapacitating disability. Court modified decree per its ruling on support and affirmed decree. Given the finding on the basis for spousal maintenance, Court of Appeals reversed and remanded on the issue of division of community property.
- In the Interest of C.V., a Child, 531 S.W.3d 301 (Tex.App.-Amarillo 2017): Tex. Dept. of Fam. Serv. brought termination action against both parents. Only mother's rights were terminated and she appealed. Court of App. found that evidence was factually and legally sufficient to support termination in the best interests of the child. Appellant did not challenge TC's findings on dangerous conduct/conditions or that this was her 2nd child to whom her rights were terminated. Affirmed.
- In the Interests of A.G. and A.F.G, Children, 531 S.W.3d 329 (Tex.App.-Houston[14th Dist.] 2017): Eight years after divorce father sought modification seeking primary custody of one child. Mother challenged and countered. Contempt and enforcement actions also brought. TC found for mother and ordered that his visitation would now be supervised. He appealed and Court of App. found no merit to his arguments and affirmed TC judgment.

Civil Rights

• Webb v. Schlagel, 530 S.W.3d 793 (Tex.App.-Eastland 2017): Defendant appealed lifetime protective order. Appeals court found that evidence supporting order was factually sufficient and the concordant restriction on firearm possession did not infringe on 2nd Am. rights as it is a reasonable and legitimate protective and restrictive measure. Affirmed.
