

Featured Resource: The U.S. Constitution and Other Writings

This column usually highlights a new or updated publication that our attorney and pro se patrons may utilize in dealing with a specific legal matter or issue. However, we have a small collection of books with a legal subject matter that are historical, informational, biographical, and simply interesting and enriching. A recent edition to this collection is The U.S. Constitution and Other Writings, published in 2017 from Canterbury Classics. This single-volume book is made up of almost 70 documents and writings on varied subjects spanning the history of our country, its government, and its people, both well-known and not-so well-known, such as: the Treaty of Paris; George Washington's First Inaugural Address; the Louisiana Purchase Treaty; Sojourner Truth's "Ain't I a Woman" Speech from 1851; the Emancipation Proclamation; Act Establishing Yellowstone National Park; Franklin D. Roosevelt's Speech on Signing the G.I. Bill of Rights; Dwight D. Eisenhower's Farewell Address; Ronald Reagan's 1987 Remarks at the Brandenburg Gate in West Berlin; and Barack Obama's First Inaugural Address in 2009.



Anyone interested in the history of our country and the events and documents that influenced and made it will find something worth reading in this book. (A law library staff-member obtained this book while attending the 2019 convention of the American Association of Law Libraries in Washington D.C., a yearly event where law librarians from all over the U.S. go to learn from each other how to more effectively serve their patrons.) Other books in the Law Library's collection are: Ten Great American Trials: Lessons In Advocacy; Historic Texas Courthouses; The New Yorker Book of Lawyer Cartoons; and The Texas Supreme Court: A Narrative History, 1836-1886. So, come on by the Law Library when you have a little time, pull up a chair, and enjoy some good books.

This Month's Featured Technology: Resources through Wife at the Justice Center



We have free WiFi access here at the Justice Center. You may know that already, but do you know what resources you have access to while you are in court or waiting for your docket call? We have multiple databases you can get access to through our WiFi. Databases in-





clude HeinOnline, Lexis Nexis Digital Library, and Gale Legal Forms Library. To access, you will need to join our WiFi network, FBCGuest. This network does not require a password, but you will need to accept the policy page. HeinOnline only requires you download the app and authenticate, or if using a computer, go to their website. Lexis Nexis Digital Library and Gale Legal Forms Li-

brary do require you to login with a library card. You can get this at any Fort Bend County public library. The process takes about 5 minutes. Specific resources you can get to include case law (through HeinOnline Fastcase search), Matthew Bender products (through Lexis Nexis Digital Library), and Gale Legal Forms including Texas specific forms in civil cases (through Gale Legal Forms Library). Criminal Law

Ex Parte Patricio Estrada, 573 S.W.3d 884 (Tex.App.-Houston [1st Dist.] 2019, no pet. h.): Case from the 268th in Fort Bend County. Defendant pled guilty to aggravated sexual assault of a child under 14, a first degree felony. A deferred adjudication order was signed placing Defendant under community supervision for 6 years and also requiring registration as a sex offender and in-patient substance abuse treatment. State filed a motion to adjudicate based on Defendant leaving the treatment facility without approval. He was thus found guilty of the above offense and sentenced to 12 years in the TDCJ. On direct appeal the 14th Court of Appeals affirmed the conviction and the Court of Criminal Appeals refused his petition for discretionary review. He was then indicted for failure to register as a sex offender. He filed a pre-trial habeas corpus application claiming violation of the double jeopardy and due process clauses of the 5th Amendment, violation of the ineffective assistance of counsel and speedy trial clauses in the 6th Amendment, and vindictive prosecution. The trial court denied his habeas writ. Defendant appealed the denial to the First Court of Appeals which held that the habeas court did not abuse its discretion in denying the application and thus affirmed its order.

Family Law

In the Interest of O.E.R. and L.F.J., Children, 573 S.W.3d 896 (Tex.App.-El Paso, 2019, no pet. h.): Texas Department of Family and Protective Services sought and was granted termination parental right of mother of two children and their respective fathers. Mother and one of the fathers appealed. In applying the *Holley* factors on the best interests of the children, the Court of Appeals upheld the termination of rights as to both parents who appealed due to violence against the children and their mother, illegal drug use, and more. Affirmed.
