

## Featured Resource: Family Law Depositions

Attorneys who practice solely or partly in the area of family law make up a significant portion of our Law Library patrons. The dockets of three of Fort Bend County's District Courts are exclusively comprised of family law matters. And among our pro se patrons those dealing with a family matter make up the greatest proportion. Family law is a major part of the work of the Justice Center and greatly impacts the lives of Fort Bend County residents. Within these cases there may arise instances where the depositions of the petitioner, respondent, or other witnesses need to be taken as part of discovery. To aid in the preparation of and execution of these depositions the Law Library has in its collection Family Law Depositions by John F. Nichols, Sr., and Joe Phillips from Juris Publishing. This regularly-updated loose-leaf publication is stocked with comprehensive, in-depth, and user-friendly materials and features. This content spans various types of family law litigation and proceedings and lays out the particular areas of inquiry that depositions in these matters need to address providing detailed practical guidance that is indispensable to attorneys and parties. This manual includes checklists, forms, outlines, and deposition exemplars as well as discussion and information

on strategy, preparation, procedure, evidence, and more. Comprising several hundred pages and with a detailed table of contents and full index it is a deep but useable guidebook. In addition to being an indispensable for deposition preparation, even if you are not anticipating taking a deposition in a particular case Family Law Depositions helps provide a roadmap for the gathering of the necessary information and evidence in aid of any family law matter. #### Civil Litigation/Defamation/Texas Citizens Participation Act

Rodriguez, Trevino, et al. v. Gonzales, 566 S.W.3d 844 (Tex.App.-Houston [14th Dist.] 2018, r'hg. denied): Defamation suit arising out of race for the Harris Co. Constable Pct. 6. Candidate Gonzales sued candidate Trevino and his family members for defamation regarding statements made on social media. Appellants moved to dismiss the claims pursuant to the Texas Citizens Participation Act (TCPA), CPRC §§27.001-27.011. As the 14th Court of Appeals noted, the TCPA exists to balance the right to bring a meritorious lawsuit for a demonstrable injury with the need to safeguard the rights of free speech, etc. Trial court denied the motion to dismiss. On interlocutory appeal the COA concluded that Trevino, et al., established the applicability of the TCPA, thus shifting the burden to Gonzalez to make a prima facie case for his claim, which as a limited purpose public figure he failed to do (required to show malice) and did not show falsity of some statements. Reversed and remanded.

#### Criminal Law

Christopher D. Speck v. The State of Texas, 564 S.W.3d 497 (Tex.App.-Houston [14th Dist.] 2018, pet. ref'd.): Defendant pled guilty to DWI following the denial of his motion to suppress. At trial Defendant moved to suppress evidence of his intoxication alleging the arresting officer lacked reasonable suspicion to initiate the stop because a signal was not required to exit the highway. Defendant had been driving in the right lane which allowed for either option of exiting or continuing on the highway. The trial court found that in such instance a signal was required. On de novo review (as the resolution of the ultimate issue turned on an application of the law to undisputed facts) the 14th COA found that Defendant indeed "changed lanes" under sec. 545.104(a) of the Transportation Code and was required to signal. Therefore, the officer had reasonable suspicion to make the stop and the trial court correctly denied the motion to suppress. Affirmed.

#### Family Law

• Thomas Gesswein v. Sharon Gesswein, 566 S.W.3d 34 (Tex.App.-Corpus Christi-Edinburg 2018, en banc r'hg. denied, pet. filed): Exwife filed in Hidalgo County seeking domestication and enforcement of an Illinois judgment of \$39,000 in unpaid spousal maintenance. Ex-husband filed a Special Appearance challenging the personal jurisdiction of the Texas courts over him to enforce a foreign judgment alleging that he was not amenable to service of process in Texas and lacked minimum contacts. She was granted substituted service which was accomplished. The court denied his Special Appearance. The COA found that service was proper and that lack of minimum contacts is not a defense to enforcement of foreign judgments as long as the issuing court properly exercised personal jurisdiction over the defendant. The Full Faith and Credit Clause requires enforcement under these circumstances. Trial court affirmed.
