# Featured Resource: Texas Criminal Lawyers Handbook & Texas Criminal Forms

The best and most easy to use resources the Library has for nondisclosure and expunction issues are the two companion guides from James Publishing entitled *Texas Criminal Lawyers Handbook* and *Texas Criminal Forms*. Chapter 22 of the *Texas Criminal Lawyers Handbook* details the rights to nondisclosure and expunction, the statutes and case law that govern each issue, when to file for each order, the effects and requirements of each order and what vi-

olations if not followed. As with each section, there will be trial notes and strategies given by the authors. In *Texas Criminal Forms*, also in chapter 22, provides the forms one would need to file for either order of non-disclosure or expunction. This section include tips and



instructions for filling out each form to make sure you are on the right track and are not missing pertinent information. Both books are written by Judge Bob Gill and Mark Daniel. The authors are both well versed in criminal law and are board certified. Judge Gill served as Judge of the 213th District Court in Tarrant County for more than 14 years and as a assistant criminal district attorney before that. Mr. Daniel spent many years as an assistant district attorney and as an attorney in private practice practicing in criminal law for 37 years. Both have lectured extensively on these topics.

#### Criminal Law/Child Pornography and Sex Offense Against Child/Evidence

Darrius D. Thomas v. The State of Texas, 586 S.W.3d 413 (Tex.App.-Houston [14th Dist.] 2017, pet. ref'd.): Defendant pled guilty to possession of child pornography and sexual performance by a child following the denial of his motion to suppress evidence. He then appealed. Defendant lived with his girlfriend and her three children. Girlfriend looked through defendant's cell phone without his knowledge and found pictures (some explicit) of her daughter taken surreptitiously while asleep. She contacted the police and Defendant was arrested. Defendant's unsuccessful motion to suppress argued that his girlfriend had accessed the photos on his cell phone in violation of the law under Penal Code §33.02 and thus since illegally obtained they could not support the probable cause underlying the search warrant. On appeal under the standard implying necessary factual findings to support the trial court's ruling, the 14th Court of Appeals found that his girlfriend did not know she lacked consent to look at his phone, thus the knowing component of §33.02 was vitiated. Without this violation of the law in the discovery of the evidence, the exclusionary rule found in §38.23(a) of the Code of Criminal Procedure was not invoked and thus the trial court correctly denied the motion to suppress. Affirmed.

#### Family Law/Termination of Parental Rights/Appellate Review

In the Interest of C. W., a Child, 586 S.W.3d 405 (Tex. 2019): Mother's parental rights were terminated and the trial court was affirmed by the San Antonio Court of Appeals. Child was 14 years old at time. Grounds for finding that termination was in the best interest of the child included sexual abuse, forcing the child into prostitution, the child's wishes not to live with her mother, and that being in her mother's care posed a threat to the child. Pursuant to the Supreme Court's prior ruling in the In Re N.G. case, under the circumstances in this case where parental rights were terminated and the parent challenges this on appeal, due process requires the appellate court to review that finding and detail its analysis, which the Court of Appeals failed to do. Petition for discretionary review granted, with the Court of Appeals' judgment being affirmed in part, reversed in part, and remanded. Per curiam.
